Abandoned landmines and other remnants of war have left humankind with a terrible and deadly legacy. Tens of thousands of innocent civilians, many of them young children, are killed or injured by landmines each year. However, the impact of these abandoned weapons, which can be found in nearly 60 countries, is even more insidious and far reaching. Landmines keep people from leading normal, productive lives; they hinder agriculture and economic development; and they undermine the establishment of lasting peace and stability in areas beset by war and conflict. This situation is changing. Through the concerted efforts of governments and civil society organizations, the nature and scope of the global landmine problem is being understood and tools are developed to solve it. For many years, Anthony Lake has been a forceful advocate promoting greater international cooperation and encouraging new solutions to eradicate landmines and provide humanitarian assistance for landmine survivors. Mr. Lake will speak about the progress that is being made, share examples of successful programs and promote our engagement to further these trends.

Anthony Lake is Distinguished Professor in the Practice of Diplomacy at the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University. He served from 1993 to 1997 as Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs. From 1981 to 1992, Mr. Lake was Five College Professor of International Relations at Amherst and Mount Holyoke colleges. Mr. Lake joined the State Department in 1962, where he served until 1970 as a Foreign Service Officer, with assignments in Vietnam and on the NSC staff. After work with the Muskie Campaign, the Carnegie Endowment and International Voluntary Services, Mr. Lake returned to the State Department in 1977 to serve as Director of Policy Planning for President Carter, a position he held until 1981. He is the author of a number of books. Mr. Lake received his Ph.D. from Princeton University.
